2023 VERMONT WILD TURKEY HARVEST REPORT

Most of the programs described in this report are funded through the **Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Program**. This program was initiated in 1937 as the Federal Aid in Wildlife Act and created a system whereby taxes are paid on firearms, ammunition, and archery equipment by the public who hunts. Today this excise tax generates more than one hundred million dollars each year that are dedicated to state wildlife restoration and management projects across the United States. The State of Vermont uses these monies for acquiring land, and for restoring and managing wildlife. These excise tax dollars, coupled with state hunting license fees, have been the predominant source of money funding the successful restoration and management of Vermont's wildlife resources.

2023 Wild Turkey Harvest Report

2023 Harvest Overview

Hunters harvested a combined total of 6,972 wild turkeys during the Vermont turkey hunting seasons in 2023, providing hunters with approximately 160,000 servings of locally sourced, sustainably harvested, nutritious protein. The 2023 harvest was amongst the highest harvest ever recorded – the highest harvest was recorded in 2018 when a total of 7,187 turkeys were taken – and was 6% higher than the previous 10-year average of 6,556.

Hunting conditions were variable during the 2023 turkey hunting seasons but were generally favorable for hunters. Temperatures and precipitation were within seasonal norms during most of May when the majority of turkeys are harvested each year (78%, 2014-2023). Although statewide surveys indicated that both soft and hard mast (i.e., nuts, seeds and fruits) production was poor in the fall of 2022, the favorable brood rearing conditions experienced earlier that year during the spring and summer months yielded a healthy flush of poults into the fall population and the relatively mild winter weather experienced since helped safeguard the health and abundance of Vermont’s turkey flock in 2023.

Vermont’s wild turkey population was estimated to be more than 45,000 birds in the fall of 2023. Examination of long-term trends of harvest and hunter effort suggests that Vermont’s turkey population stabilized in the early 2000s following a dramatic population increase throughout the

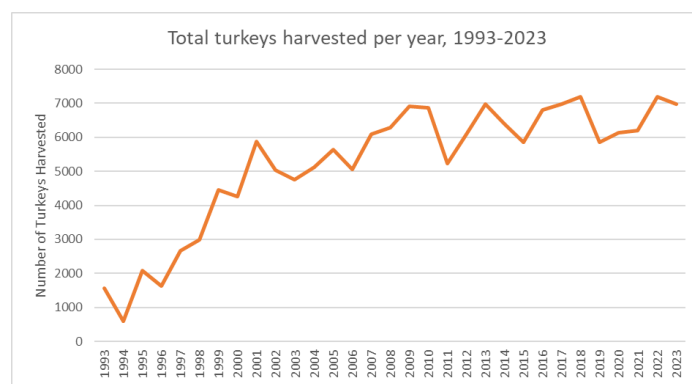
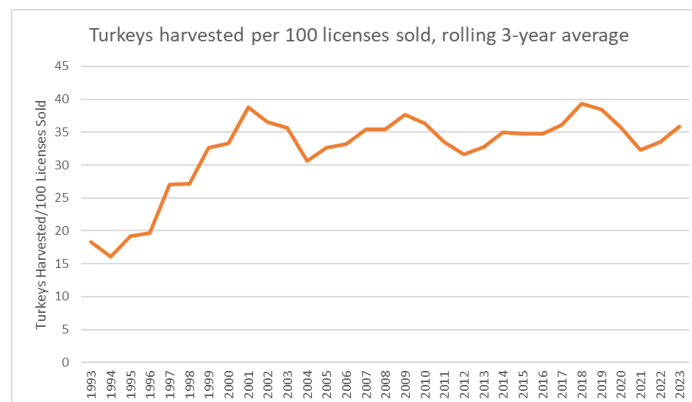


Figure 2. Turkeys harvested per 100 licenses sold, 1993-2023 (rolling three-year average).

1990s (Figures 1 and 2). The Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department continues to monitor the turkey population using hunter-sourced data and brood production indices as further detailed below. Figure 1. Total turkeys harvested per year, 1993-2023.

Season Results

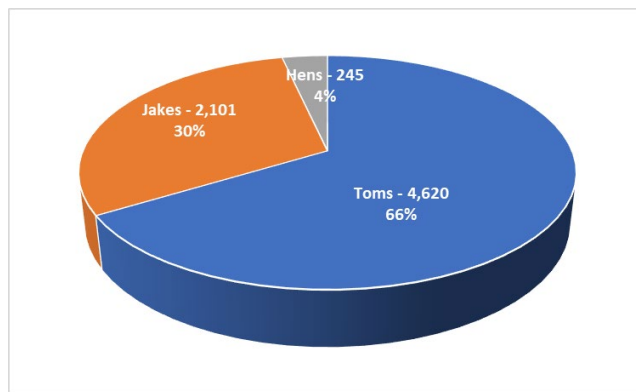


Figure 4. Distribution of the 2023 turkey harvest by season.

Adult male turkeys (i.e., two year old and older male turkeys otherwise referred to as “toms”) comprised 66% of the total annual harvest with 30% immature males (i.e., one year old male turkeys otherwise referred to as “jakes”), and 4% females, or “hens”, of various ages making up the remainder (**Figure 3**). Consistent with previous years, approximately 2% (43) of the hens harvested were reported to have beards. The regular spring season accounted for 83% of the total turkey harvest, while 5% were harvested during the regular fall season, 1% during the fall archery-only season, 11% during the youth season, and less than 1% during the novice season (**Figure 4, Table 1**).



Figure 3. Age and sex distribution of the total turkey harvest in 2023.

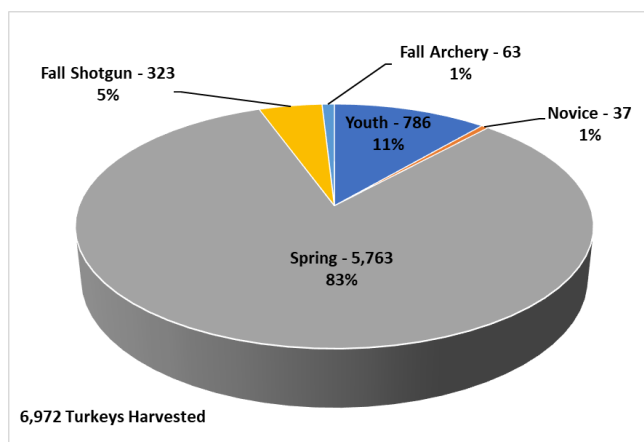

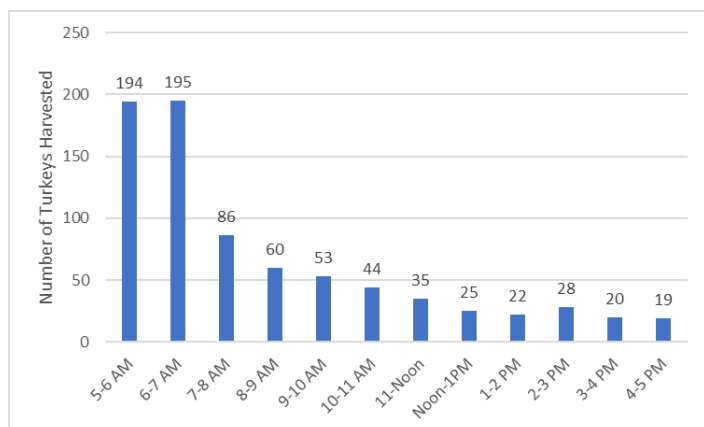

Youth Season (April 29-30, 2023)

In 2023, a total of 2,107 youth season tags were issued to prospective youth hunters which was 9.7% more than the previous year (1,921) but still 4.0% less than the previous ten-year average of 2,194. During the 2-day youth season, youth hunters harvested 786 bearded turkeys (**Table 1**) which was 23.8% more than the previous 10-year average youth season harvest of 635 birds. Youth hunters continued to enjoy a remarkably high success rate with 37.3% harvesting birds.

Beginning in 2017, legal shooting hours for the youth season were expanded from half day (i.e., one-half hour before sunrise to noon) to full day (i.e., one-half hour before sunrise to 5:00 p.m.). In line with previous years, 14.6% (114) of the total 2023 youth turkey season harvest was taken during the expanded hours (i.e., noon through 5:00 p.m.). Turkeys were harvested with relative consistency throughout the expanded hours of the youth season ranging from 19 to 28 birds taken per hour (**Figure 5**).

Novice Season (April 29-30, 2023)

Beginning in 2021, novice hunters (i.e., people who are 16 or older and who purchased their first hunting license within the previous 12 months) were afforded the opportunity to pursue turkeys during a two-day season running concurrent with, and following similar rules to, the youth season. In its third year, a total of 164 tags were issued to prospective novice hunters resulting in the harvest of 37 turkeys (**Table 1**). Although less novice hunters took advantage of this new season in 2023 (i.e., down from 225 in 2021), the success rate (22.6%) for these hunters was notably higher than in its inaugural year (15.6%).

Spring Season (May 1-31, 2023)

Hunters harvested a total of 5,763 turkeys during the spring season (**Table 1**). Hunter success rates for the regular spring season remained high in 2023 with 25.0% of licensed hunters taking at least one bird. As in most years, an impressive 37.7% of successful hunters also harvested a second bearded bird to fill the 2-bird regular spring season bag limit. Toms (i.e., two year old and older males) comprised 70.1% of the 2023 spring harvest which was 6.1% lower than the previous year and 1.5% higher than the previous 10-year average of 69.1% (2013-2022). The 2023 spring season also included 31 bearded hens in the tally. As expected, the majority (5,690) of turkeys were harvested using shotguns. The remainder of the turkeys were taken via the use of crossbows (37), vertical bows (16), and muzzleloading shotguns (20).

Fall Season (Variably by WMU, October 21-29, 2023 or October 21-November 5, 2023)

Hunters reported a total of 323 turkeys during the fall season which was 50.7% less than was taken the previous year (655) and 51.4% less than the previous 10-year average of 664 (Table 1). Although the 2023 fall turkey harvest was notably low, it remained well within the range of harvests recorded over the previous ten years. As results of the 2023 fall season continue to demonstrate, fall turkey harvests vary widely from year to year in response to several factors including, most notably, the brood rearing conditions experienced earlier in the year, hunting conditions throughout the season, and annual mast production. Despite this variability, the sex and age class distribution of the fall season remained remarkably close to previous years with immature birds comprising 32% of the harvest and adult females accounting for 32% (Figure 6). Within the region of the state having a 9-day fall hunting season (i.e., WMUs B, D1, D2, G, H, I, J1, J2, L, M, O, P, and Q), 0.053 turkeys were harvested per square mile of forested habitat whereas 0.037 turkeys per square mile of habitat were harvested within the region of the state having a 16-day shotgun season (i.e., F1, F2, K, and N). Of the 209 successful fall hunters who reported their turkeys online, 94.7% said they were targeting turkeys.

Fall Archery Season (October 7-20, 2023)

Archery hunters harvested a total of 63 birds during the 21-day fall archery season. This was

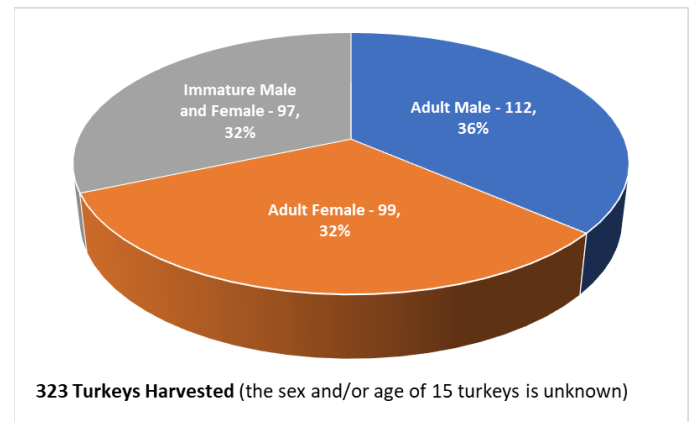
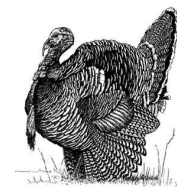
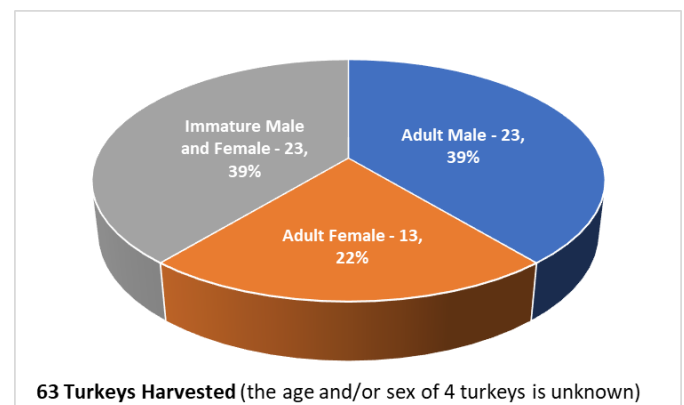


Figure 7. Age and sex distribution of the 2023 fall archery harvest.

75.1% less than the previous year (253) and 56.1% lower than the previous 10-year average harvest of 144 birds. The harvest during this season was comprised of 39% toms, 22% adult hens, and 39% immature birds of either sex (Figure 7). Of the 46 successful fall archery hunters who reported their turkeys online, 56.5% said they were targeting turkeys while the remaining 43.5% said they were targeting deer.

Figure 6. Age and sex distribution of the 2023 fall season.

Harvest Distribution

Although widespread and abundant throughout the state, wild turkeys are not evenly distributed across the landscape and, accordingly, neither was the 2023 turkey harvest. Wildlife

Management Units B, D1, J2, and O continued to record the highest total harvests with 787, 686, 702, and 589 turkeys taken, respectively (Table 2). Similarly, Wildlife Management Units A, B, F1, and F2 continued to record the highest harvest density with 1.72, 1.84, 3.16, and 1.89 spring toms harvested per square mile of forest

habitat, respectively. Collectively, these areas are known to harbor productive soils and a rich mix of habitat types including farmland and forestland, and generally experience the easiest winters – all conditions which favor turkeys and allow them to maintain higher densities.

Turkeys were harvested in 242 of Vermont’s 251 towns (Table 3) during the spring season with an average of 28.8 turkeys harvested per town and no more than 107 turkeys taken from any one town.
